🎨 Honoring Native American History & Culture

Grade Level: 1st-3rd

Duration: 45-60 minutes

Standards Alignment:

• Social Studies: Recognize Native American cultures and contributions.

Visual Arts: Use drawing to represent cultural traditions.

Language Arts: Express ideas through art and short descriptions.

Learning Objectives

- Students will learn about different Native American tribes and cultural traditions.
- Students will create artwork inspired by Native American symbols, traditions, or historical figures.
- Students will explain the meaning behind their artwork.

Success Criteria

I can name a Native American tribe or historical figure.

🔽 I can draw a cultural symbol or tradition.

I can explain what my drawing represents.

Lesson Components

1 Beginning (10-15 min) - Introduction & Discussion

- Show images and share facts about different **Native American tribes** (e.g., Navajo, Lakota, Cherokee, Iroquois).
- Read a short book or watch a video about Native American traditions (e.g., storytelling, weaving, totem poles, pottery).
- Ask: "What do you notice about their art and symbols?"

Prook Suggestion: "Fry Bread: A Native American Family Story" by Kevin Noble Maillard.

2 Middle (20-25 min) - Drawing on the ChalkWild Backpack

- Students choose a Native American symbol, tradition, or figure to illustrate.
- Possible ideas:
 - **Symbols**: Turtle (wisdom), Feather (freedom), Sun (life)
 - **Traditions**: Dreamcatchers, Pottery, Woven Blankets

- Figures: Sacagawea, Sitting Bull, Maria Tallchief (famous Native American ballerina)
- Students draw their chosen symbol/tradition/figure on their ChalkWild backpack.
- Older students add a short fact about their drawing.

×	Modification: Provide printouts of Native American symbols as guides for younger students.						

3 End (10-15 min) - Reflection & Sharing

- Gallery Walk: Students walk around and observe their classmates' artwork.
- Pair-Share: Turn to a partner and say, "I chose ____ because..."
- Class Discussion: Ask, "How do Native American traditions still influence us today?"
- Students erase their backpacks and reflect on what they learned.

- ✔ Provide printed outlines of Native American symbols for students who need fine motor support.
- ✔ Offer audio recordings or video clips for auditory learners.
- ✓ Let students verbally explain their artwork if writing is a challenge.
